Probably few of our readers see the Norwich Churchman. month's issue the Bishop of Thetford wrote an article on the responsibilites of the Parochial Church Council.

He asks the question - Who owns the Church ? - and says that a generation ago the general opinion was that the parson was responsible for it; but for some years now, especially since the growing strength of the Norfolk Churches Trust and the Associations of Friends of individual churches, the community takes responsibility. He reminds us that just over a hundred years ago the whole local community was involved in the care and maintenance of the parish church by paying Church rates. It was because of demoninational divisions that these rates were abolished - but the principle of community responsibility remains. It is symbolised by the continuing practice that all whose names are on the civilian voters list are entitled to vote in the election of churchwardens. Thus the churchwardens exercise their authority on behalf of the whole local community. The Bishop goes on to say that the Parocial Church Councils Measure of 1956 states that "it shall be the primary duty of Councils in every parish to co-operate with the Minister in the initiation, conduct and development of church work both within and without the parish".

So much for the Bishop's article. It might be appropriate hers for the community to thank all who were actively involved in organising the Village fete on Bank Holiday - also all who helped with stalls, refreshments, sideshows or in any way. The proceeds are for the Church, Chapel and Village Hall.

Passages from the Diary of The Rev. B.J. Armstrong, M.A., Vicar of East Dereham 1850 to 1888 (Published by George Harrup)

"October 12th 1870 - To Attlebersugh by train to get to New Buckenham where I am to take part in the re-opening of the Church after complete restoration. Was the guest of a Mr Howard, a Surgeon, living in excellent style, and well affected to the Church.

In the evening was instrumental in settling a difference between the

Rector and his Squire (a very ignorant and obstinate man) in reference to some seats in the chancel. Saw the game was not worth the candle and advised Rivett (the Rector) to concede the point, especially as the Squire had given all the oak for the restoration. Paid a second visit to him (the Squire) at 11.30 p.m. with this good news, and expressed a hope that now he and his wife would attend the opening services on the morrow, but they had not the grace to come, which proves his churlishness more than the original dispute does".

NEW BUCKENHAM PARISH NEWS - OCTOBER 1978

TRANSPORT. THE SURGERY. THE COTTAGE INDUSTRY. THE NATIONAL HEALTH SERVICE

I am temporarly without a car - my car having died from that endemic British disease - RUST. So for the first time in more years than I care to remember I am not free to come and go at will. Of course New Buckenham has a good 'bus service; that is if one wants to go anywhere that is on the 'bus route.

Earlier this year I stayed about four miles from Southampton. One day when I was walking to the town it began to rain, so I stopped a 'bus. I offered the conductor two pence, he looked at me as if I had been away for a very long time and told me the fare was 18 pence. I was only 3 or 4

stops from the town centre.

The other week I went by 'bus to Attleborough. 66 pence return!!!

I was not going to the Surgery but if I had need to I would board the 'bus at 9.25 a.m. and arrive at the Surgery at 9.40 a.m. If the doctor was free to see me within five minutes or so, and then give me 10 - 15 minutes of his time, I would probably leave the Surgery at 10. a.m. approximately - and then a pleasant brisk walk to Quaens Square (pleasant weather permitting) to catch the 10.25 back to New Buckenham. But supposing I suffered from heart or chest disease - or severe arthritis - or was old and infirm - that pleasant walk would be a panting labour, perhaps to miss the bus with two hours to wait and no reasonable place to shelter.

If the Doctor suggests or the patient requests a consultant's opinion the patient would have the option to see Doctor X or Mr Y privately - for the sum of £10 - £15. Why not? that sum could easily be spent on useless trivia. The patient would visit the consultant in the crttage industry at his home, that would be equipped with diagnostic aids such as an electrocardiograph and apparatus for chest screening. Is the Attleborough

health centre thus equipped? well perhaps - I do not know.

When our National Health service started in 1948 Aneurin Bevan was reported to have said, and I repeat, reported to have said to intransigent doctors - "If you won't sign their certificates I will get someone else to do so"but given growing pains the N.H.S. became the best health service in the world. However, not any more. Other countries have caught up and overtaken us.

The health service is short of money - and like the Church of England -

vastly over administered.

Why have health, pensions, and social security all mixed up together? Why not separate health insurance and although it be compulsory, let the patient insure with whom he pleases, as with car insurance - and as with car insurance let there be no claims bonus. The insurance companies could pay the doctors' fees for services rendered, and the state provide the blanket through which no one must be allowed to fall.

Inflation is apparent in every department of life - but the doctor is free - even though to visit him at one central place, namely Attleborough takes, in 'bus fares, a sizeable portion of a pensioner's weekly allowance.

The following is a copy of a letter dated the 21st September 1978 Dear Dr Hamerton, and La Lamado and the Environment: - 1701 of a reword of the Environment: - 17

I promised you a further reply to your letter of 27 July about what to do with the carvings from New Buckenham Market Cross. I have discussed the problem with colleagues here and we are agreed that:-

1. the panels are too valuable to go back up treated or untreated;

2. they ought to be treated and placed in a museum;

3. replicas should be put back on the cross. To deal with your first question, I am not sure why the panels were not grant aided with your original Historic Buildings grant. If, as I suspect, they were considered as "moveables" and therefore not grantworthy, the same would apply to an Ancient Monument grant. There is no harm in trying again for an HB or AM grant provided you agree not to put the original back on the

outside. We could not grant-aid the cost of replicas but our area superintendent of works at Cambridge (tel: 58911 ext 2240) could give the name of a firm that could make them (after conservation). You could either put the originals inside the building or place them on indefinite loan in a museum. If your villagers don't like Norwich Castle Museum, you could try the Victoria and Albert whose conservation resources must be considerably greater. Besides the apilgrim trust etc, you could ask the National Art Collections Fund.

If you would like to discuss this further please let me know.
