NEW BUCKENHAM PARISH NEWS - FEBRUARY 1975

CHRISTIAN UNITY: January 18th - 25th is the week set aparteach year for prayers for the unity of the church and I find myscif writing these notes during this period. In New Buckenham, apart from public prayers, the week passes unnoticed. In many larger places the week is kept more actively by the exchange of pulpits and altars.

Some months ago I attempted to tell you how, through the work of a greek monk, Theodore of Tarsus, the parish system came about. Those of you who have been watching the television series "Churchill's People" will know (roughly speaking) how christianity was brought to these shores. Without going into too much detail, and leaving aside the great Orthodox Church of the East, one might say, broadly speaking, that christianity emanated from Rome.

Although the relationship between the Church of England and Rome had been somewhat turbulent through the ages , the final break came with the reformation in the 16th century. About this time protestantism was gaining ground in Europe with Luther in Germany and Calvin in Switzerland. However, the Church of England always retained the Catholic faith with it's book of Common Prayer. Because of the influence of Pope John 23rd a greater understanding now exists between the Anglican and Roman Churches. In the late 16th and 17th centuries there came into being many ultra protestant sects - their cry was "Down with Bishops and Bells".

(i) The word Methodist was a nick name applied to certain devout undergraduates of Oxford in the early 18th Century. They were called the "Holy Club" and their founder, Charles Wesley, was the younger brother of John. They gained their name from the nethodical way they John Wesley was, and remained, a priest of the Anglican Faith. It was not his intention to form a breakaway church, but to revitalise the Mother church. During his lifetime (ii) Wesley considered the members of his society, called Methodists, to be still members of the Church of England and they were required to attend there for Communion. After Wesley's death the Methodists did break away from the Church and afterwards subdivided to form six or more groups. Now, however, all Methodists are united in one body.

Christians have nothing to fear from unity. Divided they are vulnerable. United they are strong and strength is needed to fight those who seek to destroy the Faith.

OUR INSTITUTIONS - the Crown, Church and law are under pressure and sometimes under attack. The cost of the crown has recently been attacked by some politicians, and others who would not claim to be "republican" have been pressing for financial accountability. The law has been strained by the utterances of those in high places, in support of lawbreaking councillors and others. The Church is badly squeezed by inflation but this is not it's worst enemy - it's worst enemy is the apathy of some of it's members and others of it's supporters who purport to love it and want it to churches whose problems are much the same.

When we think of the Church we must always between the continuer of the church we must always between the continuer.

When we think of the Church we must always be aware of it's need for future supporters. I occasionally hear it said "What a pity there are no young people in Church" and it occurs to me that the people who make this observation never look in the chancel where there are a number of teenages and young adults singing in the Choir. The fact that we, a small village, have a choir when larger neighbouring villages do not, is no accident. We are fortunate in having in Mr Burrows, a regular, good, organist and in Mrs Thomas a keen, patient, choir

Each Sunday momming the Vicarage is a hive of activity - our young Sunday School is here and the fact that we have a Sunday School when neighbouring parishes do not, is because of the long dedicated service of Miss Bird. I also want to praise the Mothers who make the effort to bring their children - and this often means a car journey. It is often said by those who want to "rationalize" the Church that Sunday Schools are old fashioned and of little value - but nothing which The Methodists from their earliest days realized the importance of Sunday Schools and these were organized with vigour. Before we allow we must heed the words of the late Dean Inge who said "A Church that future".

So where is the apathy in New Buckenham? We have people who work hard to raise money for the village and for wider charities. We have people who interest themselves in the youth of the village such as the youth club and junior band - we have the bell ringing. All these people need your support, not always your monetary support, but always your moral support and your blessing.

"I would like to pay tribute to one of my closest friends, the late Mr R.G.Robins. I found in him a very nice gentleman, one who was obliging in everyway. He had a smile and a joke for all his customers. Born in the village he is the last of our oldest tradesmen. He learnt his trade from his father, and was one of the best boot repairers around here for miles. He was a barber as well. When I first started work he made my first pair of boots and he was also the first to cut my hair. It did not matter what sort of job was taken to him, he would always have a go at it. Some things were in a bad state, i.e. horse harness, ladies handbags, pouffes, motor cyclists leather outfits and he would even patch up blacksmiths' bellows - all sewn by hand. He was the Verger in our church for many years. He, his wife and two sons were in the choir. He was a great lover of gardening. He took many prizes at the annual flower and vegetable show which used to be held in the Rookery grounds on August Bank Holiday. A keen athlete he ran at Norwich, Diss and Attleborough with Mr H. Titlow and Mr A. Murraywho lived in the village. He left his business in the first world war to serve in the Royal Horso Artillery.

I had a nice talk with him in the morning of the day he was taken with his last illness. He will be greatly missed in our village and surrounding parishes".

Rest Homes Two are owned by the Womens' Section: "Quensmead" in Bridlington Yorkshire and "Glenthorne" in Dorset. These are open throughout the year and accommodate 44 guests at a time, for a period of two weeks. Those eligible to stay, free of charge, are the wives and widows of ex-servicemen - also ex-servicewomen and close dependents of both ex-service men and women.

Glehthorne Home is beautifully equipped, the sea breaks at the foot of the cliff at the end of the garden, where a private path leads to the foreshore. The grounds overlook Portland Harbour where H.M.

Ships often lie at anchor.

Queensmead is on the front at Bridlington with a wonderful view of the bay. The shops and town are within easy walking distance.

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NEW BUCKENHAM PARISH NEWS - JUNE 1975

THE VOICE OF THE CHURCH is silent in these troubled times, so said the Rev. W. Ives, in his address to the Royal British Legion on May 11th. Not one Church leader has spoken on any of the present serious problems which afflect our country he said. And what of this month's referendum ? It may interest you to know that I have recently received a circular letter signed by the Bishop of Leicester, Fr. T. Corbishley S.T. and Rev. Alan Booth. The letter was sponsored by many other Bishops and notable christians and contained a memorandum which reads as follows:-

"Christians for Europe"

Is there a specifically christian interest in Britain's membership of the European Community? We do not suggest that Christians are necessarily bound by their faith to be committed to supporting the continuation of Britain's membership of the community, but the following are some of the reasons why a number of individual Christians believe that they must do all they can to ensure it.

(1) In a world increasingly given to judge on purely materialistic and economic grounds, it is important that ethical, spiritual, cultural and religious values should assume their due place, A Europe that can rediscover its historic vision is the best guarantee that this will happen. A larger Europe, in which each partner brings it's own specific insights, will be better able to defend those cultural and spiritual values which, in the past, have been an inspiration to mankind and which can still influence men ro realize that they do not live by bread alone.

(2) A Europe striving to forget its past quarrels and united to meet the threats that face it today will also help to reunite the separated churches and restore that Christendom which broke apart in the 16th Century (if not earlier) as much because of political and social factors as because of purely theological considerations. (3) The Community has already overcame the age old hostilities in Western Europe which, in the past, led to destructive wars. It is surely a British responsibility to maintain this movement towards peace, and help to extend it throughout the whole of Europeand to a still larger world.

(4) A continuing British presence concerned with social justice in Europe and inspired by a sense of responsibility towards the world beyond, can help to ensure that the community does not become a "rich man's club" but will serve the larger interests of mankind. "Christians for Europe" include men and women of many Churches and religious traditions united in a common conviction that the British people should be encouraged to realise the immense potential for good in the growing unity of Europe, and , consequently, the great loss to our country, the commonwealth and to the whole world that would ensue if we were to withdraw from the Community"

FLATLET HOUSES

In 1963 a London property was converted into 12 flatlets to be let unfurnished to widows of ex-servicemen and to retired ex-service women. This successful venture was followed by the conversion of property in Southport and Belfast, in a similar manner, providing 22 more flatlets.

The three houses have gas fired central heating, electicity and constant hot water. All flatlets are wired for television and radio reception and an electric panel fire is fitted.

As well as bathroom, toilets and luggage storage cupboard, there is a separate locker for each tanant in which trade orders can be placed. In 1972 a purpose built block of 22 flats was erected at Haslemere, Surrey and was officially opened by H.M.Queen Elizabeth the Queen Mother, and was named Castle of Mey House.
