Music is another means by which Faith is conveyed. Church music was based on the Jewish synagogue chant. St Gregory the Great who lived in the 6th Century took the Jewish chant and enlarged it into plain song - hence the Gregorian chant. The Gregorian singers who are giving a concert on July 9th will sing this beautiful plain Your ancestors who worshipped in this church were familiar with this type of music.

The Church has inspired great composers to write it's music, among whom are Byrd, Tallis & Merbeck, all organists of Canterbury Cathedral. All organ scholars study Bach, Handel, Purcell and Gibbons as well as

Language is a form of art. The most beautiful language is found in Archbishop Cranmer's book of Common Prayer.

Flower arrangement is yet another form of art and one that gives pleasure to so many people. From July 9th - 11th a Festival of Flowers, Art and Music will be held in the Church. This is the fourth consecutive year we have held a Festival and I think it a remarkable achievement for a small village. Edward Stephen Markness was an American and a great admirer of this Country. In 1930 he set aside the sum of two million pounds, the interest from which was to be devoted to assisting Charities in Great Britain. The Pilgrim Trust as it was called, with wide discretionary powers, has donated many thousands of pounds to countless projects over the years. One of the most recent to benefit (to the extent of £875) being the Market Cross Trust of New Buckenham.

The Civic Amenities Act of 1967 placed on the County Council as planning authority, a duty in respect of historic buildings in conservation areas, to endeavour to restore an enhance them.

It was in this context that, to mark European Architectural Heritage Year in 1975, the Breckland District Council set aside £1000 towards the cost of restoring our Market Cross. As a further encouragement to local offort, the Department of the Environment, Historic Buildings Council, agreed to contribute an amount equal to that raised by other means towards the cost.

Thus £1000 plus £875 doubled, gave us £3,750 - a tidy sum but as it turned out, still some £500 short of the amount needed to pay for the essential extensive repairs being undertaken. Bearing in mind the Department's offer to "Double our Money" we really have to

look for another £250.

This then is the extent of the appeal which is now being launchedto raise £250 - a local contribution, modest in relation to the total

sum involved and surely well within our means.

A collecting box inviting contributions from visitors is now placed near the Market Cross each day, and small sums are being received. The main burden is, however, on us. Dr Hamerton, Mr Breeze, Mr Rutledge or I will be pleased to receive donations on behalf of the Trusts

THE ENDOWMENTS AND GLEBE MEASURE

This Measure will be debated on the floor of the House of Commons in October. It has already been passed by the General Synod and has also been passed by the House of Lords.

Few people know what it is about, but briefly and to quote from a circular obtained from John Cordle M.P. Chairman of the Church Party in

Parliament

"Benefactions of Endowment and Glebe given in times past - ancient and modern - to individual parishes will be alienated from them and the fruits distributed in ways not in accordance with the original covenants!

Against the Measure:

- 1. Diversionary powers to remove "excess" income from wealthy benefices already exist under the Pastoral Measure 1968.
- 2. It will not produce "new money". Any re-arrangement of existing money will put up the cost of administration. flowing

Results/from the Measure.

- 1. Parishes lose any right to have an incumbent.
 - 2. The parson's "freehold" is destroyed when existing freeholders vacate their livings.
- 3. It will deter potential donors of capital sums of money as well as the testamentary bequests in favour of the Church.
 - 4. It is likely to produce an even greater mobility of clergy than exists already. This will detrimental to parishes and probably destroy the system altogether.

The General Synod that overwhelmingly passed the Measure, even though it had not been fully discussed at the lower synods have produced two pamphlets giving basic facts.

- 1. It is an overall strategy to maintain the Church of England's ministry nationwide.
 - 2. The number of men in the ordained ministry is likely to fall from 12,000 to 11,000 in 1981.
 - 3. The reasons laid down by the Synod for the necessity of this Measure is that a pooling of resources will attain both fairness and flexibility.

Many measures have preceded this: 1951 saw the pooling of endowments held by the Commissioners for particular benefices.

4. The ability to raise an income will ho longer be the criterion for a parish to have it's parson but the number of people on the electoral roll will gain importance in deciding the pastoral needs of a parish.

If you feel strongly either way, write to your M.P. My opinion is that any changes made in the parochial system should be tentaive and not so designed that they become irreversible.

Some people may wonder why I dnn't pray for rain. Bearing in mind two old adages "It's an ill wind that blows nobody any good" and "One man's meat is another man's poison", I think the most appropriate prayer is the one I have used these last weeks. It is the Rogation Collect - "that God may send such seasonable weather that we may enjoy the fruits of the earth".

NEW BUCKENHAM PARISH NEWS - NOVEMBER 1976

For where two or three are gathered together in my name, there am I in the midst of them. St Matthew 18 vv 20.

It is often said today, that the burden of maintaining numerous parish churches is too much for the economy of the Church to bear, and the size and number of Churches are out of keeping with the small congregations. One therefore imagines that a church such as our parish not so. In the past, always full to capacity. I am sure this was This habit was in keeping with the discipline of the age. It was also the age of rhetorical preachers and fine choirs.

In the early Victorian and Georgian age the Church of England was weak, and it was because of the apathy and lethargy of the Church that John Wesley formed his breakaway movement. At that time rich livings were offered to men of private means, leaving the poor scholars to fill the poor livings. A man would sometimes accept numerous livings and not be incumbent in any of them. He would put Curates to hold the livings and give them a small proportion of the stipend. They augmented this by teaching, many vicarages contained small schools.

A one time Vicar of New Buckerham, William Fison, lived chiefly in London leaving a Curate here. His great great grandson, an Australian physician, called at the Vicarage last year. He wanted to see the dates of William Fison's signature in the registers. This

The Norfolk diarist Parson Woodforde attended Church one Christmas morning to find only 25 Communicants present. The good parson was not discouraged, and invited the old and poor to Christmas dinner.

All through the ages, going back to Jewry, it was, as now, the remnant that kept the Church going. I am not writing this in order that those who do not attend Church regularly should feel comfortable but that those who do not attend church regularly should not despair. These are fascinating reading. It was this time last year that Mrs William Good from New York paid her first visit to New Buckenham. A chance post card from an Aunt sent in 1939, made her interested in her father's birthplace - Rose Cottage - then three dwellings! On her first visit Mrs Good asked for the date of her father's birth and the dates of her Grandfather's birth and death. This presented a puzzle as her father and his younger brother and sisters used the surname Hewett. The older brother and sisters used the surname Symonds - as did her grandfather. Her great grandfather however, used the name Hewett-Symonds.

Tracing this family back into the 18th century provided me with an absorbing task and I spent many happy hours doing this - a welcome change from evening television. The names in the registers became alive and I could imagine them living here - I even decided how they all looked. I imagined James Hewett Symonds who married Eliza le-Fevre Richardson in 1832 - they both signed the register - unusual in those days - to be reasonably educated. However they came down in the world as none of their children could sign and Robert John (Bishy), Mrs Good's grandfather was a drover. Her great grandfather was a farmer, I imagined Eliza le-Fevre to be of Huguenot descent and the girls names favoured through the ages were Hortensia, Henrietta, Clarrissa, Adeline and Anne-Marie.

When I told Mrs Good her family was a humble one, and her father's home was probably very poor, she didn't think that mattered at all. Indeed it doesn't, for all families are old families, and all dead blood is blue.

It is very difficult for me to get myself into the "mood" of Christmas in mid-November. I make the Parson's usual pleas about the way we celebrate this great festival - and I feel these are increasingly important these days:

- 1. Let out observance of Christmas be timely not doing it all before the event and pre-empting the Festival of its real significance. Nowadays Christmas shopping starts in September (or earlier) - parties, carols etc in early December. By the time the 25th comes we are exhausted with the whole business. What is more Advent slips by and we do not use it as it should be used - a time of careful spiritual preparation to receive the Christ child into our hearts anew.
- 2. Let out Christmas observance be fitting to the One whose Birthday it is. As a modern calypso carol puts it "When you're drinking all night at your Christmas ball, He didn't come here for that at all. He came down from heaven to set us free from all our sins for eternity".
- 3. Let our Christmas be modest. I see little sign of economic crisis and austerity in the way we are still being encouraged to spend, spend, spend. The lavish excesses of our modern Christmasses are a far cry from the austere hardship of the manger, the stable, the rough night ride on a donkey to escape from Herod. This Child came to free us from self-centredness and yet we are self-indulgent in the way we celebrate His birth.
- 4. Let our Chirstmas be a time of sharing. Sharing what we can with the lonely the hungry, the sad, the poor, the forgotten, for in as much as we do it to the least of these His brethren, we do it to Christ Himself and that is the best possible Birthday present we can ever give Him.
