NEW BUCKENHAM PARISH NEWS - JULY 1975

THE PARISH THAT CAME ALIVE This is the title of a little publication which was recently sent to me. I am reminded of my early days here, when, in conversation with an E.D.P. reporter, I spoke of New Buckenham as a dying village. This was put into newsprint and some of the people here were very upset about it.

I new refer to New Buckenham as a thriving little town - and it is. Because of the efforts of small groups of people, many events are organised, and a great deal of money is raised. However, the time will come, and shortly, when energy is spent, interest flags, and new ideas

are absent what then ?

The Church is the oldest building in the village; for over 700 years the people of the village have maintained it, endowed it, worshipped there, and lived within the shadow of the tower. The time has come, and I am sure not for the first time, when the Church people have to be asked - what is the Church for ? There are over 80 people on the Church's electoral roll; this is a considerable number.

The fictional parish portrayed in the little publication found an answer which solved all it's problems. The Church people (which in New Buckenham would include not only the 80 people on the electoral roll but others who have not taken steps to put themselves on the roll) decided to STEP FORWARD TOGETHER. This meant accepting the invitation of Jesus when he said "FOLLOW ME" - in fact it meant personal commitment.

Many people found this involved them in the work of the Church to a far greater extent than in the past. Not everyone is good at money raising. Many people have little money to spend. The work of the Church for the committed christian is far greater than money raising. It embraces all aspects of caring - for the old, the sick, the lonely; also for young people with problems and for children. The talents which can be put to use are many and varied, e.g. musical, ability to teach, gardening and other forms of practical art. Many people say that without money raising events the community spirit of the Church would be lost; but what greater sense of community can there be than to meet each Sunday for to praise and for to pray? and what greater sense of community than to join together for the church's great and first accordance to the Holy Community. and what greater first service - the Holy Communion ? What of the fanance ... if every member on the Church's electoral roll decided to STEP FORWARD TOGETHER in the spirit of personal commitment to Christian Communion there would be no need for money ever to be mentioned.

FLATLET HOUSES

In 1963 a London property was converted into 12 flatlets to be let unfurnished to widows of ex-servicemen and to retired ex-service women. This successful venture was followed by the conversion of property in Southport and Belfast, in a similar manner, providing 22 more flatlets.

The three houses have gas fired central heating, electicity and constant hot water. All flatlets are wired for television and radio reception and an electric panel fire is fitted.

As well as bathroom, toilets and luggage storage cupboard, there is a separate locker for each tanant in which trade orders can be placed. In 1972 a purpose built block of 22 flats was erected at Haslemere, Surrey and was officially opened by H.M.Queen Elizabeth the Queen Mother, and was named Castle of Mey House.

ROYAL BRITISH LEGION - WOMENS' SECTION SCHEMES

The Widows allowance Fund was started in 1938 for the purpose of granting a weekly allowance to the Widows of ex-servicemen who are suffering very real hardship and unable to work because of old age, ill health or other physical causes. The standard allowance is 75p. per week for a limited number of widows, who must first have applied for a supplementary pension or state allowance, before an application can be made.

At the present time 550 widows are given this allowance and we must ensure that there is no widow of an ex-serviceman in our district who is lonely and in need of help. This applies to all classes of society.

Before you receive your parish news you will have received a government publication which has cost a vast sum of money to produce - telling us how to help the country in these inflationary times ! THE ROYAL BRITISH LEGION INDUSTRIES are at the Royal British Legion Village, Maidstone, Kent. The aim of the Industries is to provide rehabilitation and sheltered employment and where necessary suitable accommodation in the village for severely disabled ex-servicemen and their dependents who are handicapped by any of the following:

(a) Diseases of the heart and lungs.(b) Certain psychiatric disorders(c) Other physical disabilities.

Rehabilitation is aimed at preparing each disabled person for sheltered employment in the Industries or if possible, for eventual transfer to open employment - they spend up to six hours a day at work, Sheltered employment is provided for those disabled persons who are able to complete a full working day but because of the severity of their disabilities are unable to compete in open employment. There are 68 places for single and over 100 houses for married people. Some of the goods made in the factory are leather items (including handbags), jewellery, baskets including trays, toys fancy goods and toilet soap.
