## NEW BUCKENHAM PARISH NEWS - JUNE 1974

TERMS OF REFERENCE "There is a lot to be said for the Ten Commandments" said Dr Coggan, Arch-Bishop of York - soon to be Archbishop of Canterbury. Maybe today's society suffers from the lack of a reference book for behaviour. If we go on as now, we shall be unable to tell the difference between right and wrong, good and bad, health and sickness.

Half a century ago, the Commandments were used as guide lines.

Everyone, young and old, knew them and could recite them from memory.

For more than 20 years the Church has stopped saying them in the appropriate place, which is in the Communion service. Instead of which is said:-

"Thou shall love the Lord Thy God with all thy heart, with all thy soul and with all thy mind. This is the first and great commandment. The second is like unto it, namely this - Thou shall love thy neighbour as thyself".

The reason the church has allowed the commandments to fall into disuse is because 25 or more years ago it was thought unnecessary - even wrong to put emphasis on negative standards and the commancments are largely negative.

Love is positive - but what is love ?

The English language is deficient in that it has only one word to interpret the many forms of love and no particular word to interpret its highest form. Terrible things are done in the name of love - and in it's name can all the commandments be broken. If we do not know how not to

hurt our neighbour, how can we even begin to love him?

Most of us break some of the commandments some of the time, and some people break most of them all the time. There is one commandment which is widely disregarded by people, by groups and by nations. The lack of it's observance is responsible for much of the greed and envy in society, which in turn contribute to our present enemy INFLATION..

It is this the tenth commandment - "Thou shalt not covet thy neighbour's house, thou shalt not covet thy neighbour's wife, nor his servant, nor his maid nor his ox, nor his ass, nor anything that is his"

### RECIPE. LAMB CUTLETS - PORTUGAISE.

8 Lamb cutlets, 1 onion,  $\frac{3}{4}$ lb tomatoes, 1 clove garlic. 2 ozs butter. A little grated cheese, 1 teaspoonful chopped herbs.

METHOD Peel and chop onion, crush garlic, skin quarter and seed tomatos. Melt butter in saucepan, add onion and garlic. Cook gently for ten minutes.

Add tomatoes and season with salt pepper and sugar. Add herbs. Mix well and allow to simmer for ten minutes until

mixture is well reduced.

Grill the cutlets 5 minutes each side. Arrange on fire proof dish. Spoon mixture on each cutlet. Sprinke grated cheese on each and put under a pre-heated grill for a few minutes until cheese is brown.

Serves 4 people.
