BEST KEPT VILLAGE COMPETITION The judge(s) will pay particular attention to the following points:-

(a) Structural and decorative condition of Commercial and private buildings, including the appropriate use of colour.

(b) Condition of hedges, fances, walls and gates.

(c) Condition of trees.

(d) Condition of village or town centre/green/playing field(s). Greens are judged in the separate competition at the same time.

(e) Condition of Churchyard (This is judged in the separate competition

at the same time)

(f) Tidiness of flower and vegetable gardens and allotments.

(g) Condition of 'bus shelters, 'bus stops, telephone kiosks etc.

(h) Absence of litter and unsightly refuse dumps.

(i) Advertisements and noticeboards.

(j) Surrounds to War Memorials or other monuments.

(k) Surrounds to schools and public halls. (Village halls are judged in the separate competition at the same time).

(1) State of road verges, ponds, streams and ditches.

(m) Condition of outhouses, sheds etc.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT (Part 1 by Rev. H. Whitwham)

At the grass roots the Parish Council, which is elected by all on electoral roll, looks after the affairs of the village, such as street lighting, public paths etc. When a Council house in the village becomes vacant the Clerk of the R.D.C. sends a list of applicants to the Parish Council and these names are discussed in Council - therefore, it is a good thing for applicants to see any member of the Parish Council and discuss their problems. The Councillor can then put forward the applicants reasons for priority, as the Parish Council decides the order of priority. The Clerk then sends their findings to the Clerk of the R.D.C. and we now come to the Second stage in local government. Ours is the Wayland, it covers a wide area, and each Parish Council sends one or more Councillors to sit on the R.D.C. There are about 54 members of which I am the only member for New Buckenham since it is a small village. The work of the Council is done in Committees, of which there are six, namely, public health, housing, highways, planning, finance and general purposes, and officers and staff. These meet each month, and some, such as housing, twice monthly. This brings me to where I left off with the Parish Council. At the housing committee your member has to say who is the Parish Council's choice, stating why they have made that choice. Other members will then put forward their hard luck stories. The Committee has to decide by vote who is to have the house. This procedure is the same for the building of a house or garage. Plans have to be submitted to the planning committee, who then decide if it is within the village envelope. If the land where the house is to be built is in a remote part then the committee has to decide if the landscape will be spoilt etc. All committee decisions have to come before the whole R.D.C. for approval before they become absolute. This has the power to revoke a decision and refer it back for further discussion. This is why it is so important for Councillors not to leak any information from committees.

Ecclesiastic fees measure 1962 - Revised June 2nd 1972. Those of you who are interested, will find the revised table displayed in Church. Space does not permit for the various fees to be listed here, but briefly the cost of marriages, burials and other things such as certificates, searches, monuments etc. are going up in price. A full choral wedding will cost up to £9.75. This is a steep increase - but in an age when divorce is becoming easier, it is perhaps appropriate that marriage should be more difficult, and more expensive. Inevitably in a complex and changing society all marriages will not endure the test of time. The reasons for matrimonial breakdown are varied, often pitiable, and sometimes appear to be completely unavoidable. It is important that young people embarking on marriage should consider it a permanent institution, and not be carried away on the high sea of romance, or the tide of infatuation. We hear a lot these days about trial marriages. Every marriage is a trial for the two people concerned. As with all trials the verdict comes at the end, not at the beginning. It is, therefore, the Darby's and Joan's not the Jacks and Jills who are able to pronounce on marriage. We also hear a lot about compatibility - the assumption being that if the parties live together for a few months before marriage and find that they are compatible, this harmony will endure. However, it takes more than this co cope with the chances and changes of life. These may be adverse, such as serious financial problems, redundancy, unemployment, homelessness serious illness, either physical or mental, of one or other partner, and so on. Marriage may be regarded as a business. An important ingredient in business is work. If the marriage begins well, it won't stay that way unless both parties work to see that it does. If, however, it begins badly, and both parties work hard to try and make it successful, it should improve.

There is a great deal of work done by the Council Committees. The public health committee is responsible for collecting of rubbish and night-soil. It is also responsible for connecting the various villages night-soil. It is also responsible for connecting the various villages night-soil. It is also responsible for the New Buckenham to public drainage. I can take some credit for the New Buckenham sewerage scheme, having got it put second on the list, when it was at the bottom. The Chief Public Health Officer is empowered to inspect food sold in shops, cafes etc. - the testing of water in public bathing pools, wells etc. Slaughter houses are regularly inspected. The Council has to provide inspectors to examine every beast. The Housing Committee is responsible not only for allotting houses, but also for building them. The public health and housing committees are the most active ones.

As you all know, the face of local government is changing. 1974 will see the end of Wayland R.D.C. The amalgamation which will take place will result in something bigger, all though it is yet to be seen if this will be better.

I have been glad to serve on local government. It is helpful for the parish priest to be able to serve his parishoners in a secular capacity. Thus he is able to make contact with those who don't attend church, who are seldom at home when called upon, but who nevertheless have problems, often difficult ones, which the representative for the R.D.C. can often help to sort out.
