THE OLD TESTAMENT - This, I commend to your further reading - The 1st lesson at Matins, and at Evensong is always taken from the Old Testament. To those who do not read the Bible regularly, and who have not studied it, these lessons must seem dull, boring and irrelevant. Indeed it has often reach suggested to me that because these portions of scripture are incomprehensible to most, there is little point in reading them. Years ago of course, in every Church Community, a regular weekly feature would be the Bible reading class. It is therefore reasonable to suppose that the average parishoner of yesteryear would be more conversant with his/her Bible than the average parishoner of today.

Briefly, and for purpose of study the Old Testament can be

divided into three parts.

The history of the Hebrew people, which spans thousands of years. It includes God's revelation; the falling from favour because of their idolatry, and because they came under the influence of the heathen; their punishment, (exile, bondage, famine and plague) and their eventual atonement.

SECOND The writing of the law, which still forms the basis of our legal system. Just, and humane, it has stood the test of time. The Jewish law was ceremonial, moral and social. The laws relating to food and hygiene reflected the climate and other conditions and were the expression of concorn for the people's health. The laws were designed to protect weak, and to prevent exploitation by the strong and powerful. Laws for the use of land were designed both for conservation and productivity. THIRD Poets and Prophets, i.e. Psalms, Proverbs, Ecclesiastes, Solomon,

Isaiah, Jeremiah etc. Take up your Bible and read the psalms. They ask questions, and they give answers. They comfort and they praise. Consider Fealm 23. Everybody knows the words. It is a picture of an ideal. If God is the shapherd, that ideal can be realized in conditions far from deal - even in times of trouble, danger and death. For those who are worried about today's society, consider Psalm 37 "Fret not thyself because of eval doers, neither be thou envious against the workers of iniquity. For they shall soon be cut down like grass and wither as the green herb. Trust in the Lord and do good: so shalt thou dwell in the land and verily thou

shalt be fed".

Writers through the ages have tried to interpret things as they are not as politicians would have us see them. For this they are often persecuted. A famous Russian writer has recently been exiled for doing this. Poets are realists, they describe the conditions, but do not give the answers. The following passage might well have been written by a twentieth century writer, "Vanity of vanities says the Preacher, vanity of vanities! All is vanity. What does man gain by all the toil at which he toils under the sun? A generation goes and a generation comes, but the earth remains for ever. The sun rises and the sum goes down, and hastens to the place where it rises. All things are full of weariness ... and there is nothing new under the sun". (Ecclesiates 1: 2 - 9.

# NEW BUCKENHAM PARISH NEWS. NOVEMBER 1974.

The Preacher Sir Keith Joseph has been criticised by his political opponents and also by his political supporters, for the speech he recently made.

On the one hand a small part of the speech was taken out of context and used to portray him as some kind of Hitler - and on the other hand, those who commented on the whole of his speech suggested that it was no business of polititians to preach about public morality.

We are un-used these days to hear any adverse comment on the behaviour pattern, which has been changing since the war. All change has been in

the name of that hazy thing - progress.

It used to be thought the duty of leading Churchmen and leaders of other religions denominations to make this type of public pronouncement! However the church for many years has appeared to be clinging to the bandwaggon of popular thought, fon fear of appearing retrogressive. It was therefore refreshing to read this samewhat retrogressive speech was made by a distinguished intellectual and fellow of All Souls. Sit Keith suggested that our attitudes towards work reward, frift, savings, education, patriotisim and the family etc used to be right, but are wrong now.

He also suggested our national behavious pattern cannot be separated from our sick economy. The implication being that permissive behaviour on a national scale tends to be costly, whereas to live within the confines of a sound behaviour pattern is nationally more economical. Sit Keith feared we were being destroyed from within, which is all the more tragic since we fought and destroyed Philip of Spain, Napoleon, the Kaiser and Hitler.

Most of us would hate to live in an authoritative state. Self discipline beginning in childhood and continuing throughout life, gives us the greatest freedom. It is self discipline which makes us do things for others when we are tired and dispirited. It brings us to Church on Sundays when we would rather stay at home and read the Sunday papers. It brings us to Choir practice on Tuesdays when we would rather stay in the warm.

There is an old Spanish Proverb which says "Take what you want said God and pay for it". When we do the paying we consider what we take. When someone else does the paying perhaps we consider less. However, payment is always extracted, and the score is always settled.

# NEW BUCKENHAM PARISH NEWS - DECEMBER 1974

A "Merry" Christmas to you all. As we make plans to celebrate the religious feast which is nearly 2,000 years old and the secular feast which is much older, probably the old Roman feast of Saturnalia, we might pause for a moment and ponder on the sorry state of the world. We are told that during this last decade Church attendance has fallen by as much as 20%. This includes the Anglican, Roman and all the free Churches. Recently the Bishop of Southwark was asked for his opinion why this should be so, and he thought that modern living in an industrial Society, the crowding of our cities etc made it difficult for people to make Church attendance, or religious observance part of their lives. He noted that the Church had more influence in rural areas.

When people first moved from the mral areas and lived in the towns born of the industrial revolution, this did not drive them away from religion, for although the Church was going through a lukewarm stage at that time, Methodism was very strong, particularly in industrial areas. Where then have the Churches failed? They have tried to note with the times and have condoned that which in times past they would have condemned - but events overtake nations, policies and people. On all this shifting sand the Church must be the rock of faith and only if it is this will it be able to reach out to troubled people in a troubled world.

CAKE RECIPE

#### BEER MAKING

Here is a recepe I found a few years ago which is simple to make with excellent results to show. It is called "OHNE ZUCKER" which is German for 'no sugar". <u>Ingredents</u> 1½ lbs Malt extract, 10 ozs hops, yeast and 1 gallon water. <u>The Method</u> Melt the malt extract in the water; place the hops in a nylon bag and boil together for 30 minutes. Strain off the hops and squeeze as much liquid out as possible. Make up to 1 gallon with cold water and place in a plastic or earthenware container (not metal). Add a small quantity of yeast when cool and keep in a warm place for 5 - 7 days. When the surface of beer is clear, syphon into clean bottles adding teaspoon sugar per pint. Keep for 14 days in a cool place when beer is then ready to drink. It improves if you can keep it longer.
